

Laws like the Americans with Disabilities Act protect people with disabilities from discrimination in public services, employment, education, and their communities. A pandemic, like COVID-19, does not change those rights, unless it puts medical staff or others in danger.

If you go to the hospital during this pandemic, you have rights.




You have a right to medical care like everyone else. You cannot be denied medical care, including a ventilator (a machine that helps you breath), just because of your disability.



 You have a right to bring a friend, family member, or personal assistant who will assist you at the hospital, if needed to communicate, to understand the management of my care, or for selfcare. This is a reasonable accommodation.



You have a right to your service dog.





- You have a right to get information in ways you understand.
- If blind, you have a right to information in Braille or large print.
